As you are aware we have no school, church, pub or shop in Hepscott and the Village Hall is the only communal place where the people of Hepscott Parish can socialize locally. The hall is the only local meeting place which allows the community to get to know each other and generate a sense of belonging.

Some of you may be aware that the Hepscott Village Hall is very popular and has a range of activities throughout the week/year. We have regular clubs that meet weekly at the hall, private functions, entertainment, e.g. music, drama, comedy, race nights, wine tasting and quizzes etc. All of which are well subscribed. Unfortunately due to the size of the hall and lack of storage, we are unable to accommodate as many people who would like to attend some of the events, nor accommodate all of the groups that have expressed an interest in hiring the hall for weekly events.

Unfortunately 'clubs' for younger people, such as mother and toddler and youth clubs don't run from the hall due to lack of space, facilities and storage and this is detrimental to the continuation of the hall.

We have decided to apply for a lottery grant to help us finance an extension to the hall which if successful would give us another large function room, storage space and more parking facilities. PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

ANNUAL REPORT FOR THE YEAR MAY 2013-MAY 2014

It has been a hectic year and my maiden innings as Chair. Many thanks indeed go to my Deputy Chair, David Cowans, and to all of the other Parish Councillors for all the help and support they have given me, attending meetings, standing in, handling issues and providing advice, kind words and succour when needed. I must say I couldn't have asked for a better team. Most of the Councillors have had their first year too—I hope that they found it enjoyable and rewarding. Other new faces were Glen Sanderson, County Councillor, who has always been helpful and supportive, and of course Sylvia Johnson our new Parish Clerk, who has worked so hard for us and so well. 'Older hand' Ian Lindley, County Councillor for Stobhill including Stobhill Manor was also very helpful and supportive throughout the year. Thanks to you all.

'Hectic' means that we dealt with a lot of meaty issues in the year. Having fought off Sainsbury's a few years ago we have another threat to the field to the southeast of Stobhill Roundabout; Barratt are planning to build 400 houses there. Hepscott Parish Council (HPC) opposed this vigorously and, having formed the Hepscott and Morpeth Together group, will be fighting this at the Public Inquiry due to start 22 July. Our thanks go to the support we have had from Alison Bayard of Stobhill Manor and from Joan Tebbutt, both of Morpeth Town Council.

HPC has been a very active member of the Morpeth Neighbourhood Plan group, with representatives on 5 Committees including the Steering Group. This will be enormously useful to Hepscott, but I ask for patience as it is proving to be a longer term project. Special mention should be made of the hard work that David Cowans has put in to the Heritage Group. We made strong representations that major new housing in Morpeth should be located to the north of the town and this is supported by the Neighbourhood Plan group. We are also proposing flood management policies that should be of great help to Hepscott when adopted. HPC were vociferous in their views on the inner Green Belt boundary around south Morpeth. We hope at least that we will secure Safeguarded Land status there until beyond 2032, but there is no feedback from Northumberland County Council until the mid-August issue of their latest draft of the Core Strategy. Meanwhile we fear in our darker moments that the Barratt Public Inquiry may render all this effort useless.

Other issues successfully dealt with during the year included nearly 20 planning applications in the Parish, many of which proved to be long running. We supported Loansdean residents hopefully to stop 200 Bellway homes putting rain run-off into Catch Burn, a tributary of Hepscott Burn. And we tried to move into the 21st century with the launch of our website, and regular email newsletters to interested Hepscott Parish residents.

The above report was given to the AGM of the Parish Council on 15 May. At the meeting I was, for my sins, re-elected Chair for 2014-2015, with David Cowans as the Vice Chair and I am pleased to say the entire Council opted to serve for another year.

GETTING THE MOST OUT OF YOUR SUPERFAST BROADBAND

By now, most of those who had snailspeed broadband will have switched to the Fibre Optic superfast alternative and will have increased their speeds by at least 10 times. However, you may have found that while your computer is brilliant, other WiFi devices such as iPads, phones etc are still disappointingly slow elsewhere around the house.

Here's the solution:

First measure your speed using Speedtest.net. You can do it on, say, your iPad, and try several places around your property. Also try it on your computer. If you find it much slower on the iPad then you need a Powerline device, e.g. from Amazon. My speed was 26mbps on the computer but 3mbps in my back room. You need to get just a pair of these, one plugs into the mains by your computer and is linked to your router, the other plugs in where you want WiFi elsewhere in the house. The WiFi is sped through the mains. Bingo!

Views from County Hall

One year on from the election, I can confirm that you have kept me busy with a varied menu of topics. There have been a few late nights at County Council Planning committee meetings where difficult planning applications have been discussed, and I remember well the ups and downs of the Public Meeting that I requested to discuss the Stobhill Housing proposals. That issue will rumble on for some time, of course, but I feel that the village has made its views well known in a very logical way.

We have made some progress on picking up on the pothole problem, but there are still a lot of poor areas that need attention.

I have been particularly concerned that the Mobile Speed camera vans are often parked up at Fairmoor and Fulbeck - over 2300 fixed penalty notices were issued over a recent six month period - whilst efforts to get the vans at Barmoor to work there have, so far, fallen on deaf ears. We will not give up on that, however.

I was pleased to be able to contribute some funding towards the speed gun for the Speedwatch volunteers in the village who, I understand, are making a difference already.

Particularly, I would like to thank the Parish Council and its chairman, Philip Ashmore, for the friendly and effective way in which we have worked over the past year. I am sure there will be a new menu for this coming year, and I look forward to it.

In the meantime, if there are any issues with which you need a hand, please let me know.
